Nature's Action Guide: Additional Resources

Here are some useful resources not yet included in Nature's Action Guide:

- Gardening when access or mobility is limited. Physical challenges, such as illness or injury, can interfere with one's ability to garden, yet access to a
 garden can improve one's morale and boost healing. With a little help from friends and family, a garden can be made more accessible. The British
 organization Thrive provides helpful resources. Visit thrive.org.uk and click on "Get Gardening".
- Estimate a tree's benefits: With the iTree app, you can enter the diameter of a tree and its species to learn about its ecoservices. For example, a 5-inch diameter maple can remove 790 pounds of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, intercept 9,000 gallons of rainfall, help to avoid 508 gallons of runoff and filter out 9 pounds of pollution like ozone and PM2.5 from the air we breath. Visit itreetools.org to learn more about this app and other iTree tools for estimating the benefits of trees.
- Free DIY Plans for Building a Catio: Keeping cats indoors solves the crisis of bird predation by cats (our pet cats kill between 320 million to 1 billion birds each year; see Nature's Action Guide, page 2.10 for more information), but offering our beloved cats a safe outdoor place is even better. In their article "How to build a catio for your cat", the SPCA offers free PDF plans for building catios, including window catios, enclosed porch catios, stand-alone catios, and even a catio enrichment plan to enhance existing catios. Search online for "SPCA how to build a catio for your cat".


A Way to Garden: A Podcast with Margaret Roach

Nature Craft: Twig furniture

Nature crafts are a fun way to invite people to get a taste of the joy and wonder of the outdoor world. Making twig furniture is an engaging project that can lead to play in magical miniature worlds.



Collect thin straight twigs. For the chair, cut short pieces of twigs for the legs, seat, and back. Cut two thinner pieces to support the back crosswise. Use craft glue or a glue gun (with adult help) to attach the pieces. The bench is built in the same way as the seat of the chair but made longer. The stool uses three thin twigs for legs and a cross-section of a thicker branch for the seat.

This idea comes from the wonderful book Nature's Art Box by Laura C. Martin (Storey Publishing, 2003) which features 65 projects made with natural materials, including twig animals!



River birch twigs work especially well for making twig furniture.


Grid for marking windows to prevent bird glass strikes: Screening or marking the outside of windows is one of the easiest and most impactful actions we can take to protect wildlife. Painting dots on windows in a 2-inch grid is perhaps the quickest method for accomplishing this. Nothing fancy is needed, simply a small paint brush and some light-colored acrylic paint left over from a home project. Print and tape this handy grid (shown at right) to the INSIDE of a windowpane, and paint dots on the OUTSIDE. Move the grid to the next pane. The last page of this newsletter prints as an 8.5 x 11-inch grid. Making multiple copies requires fewer trips inside to move the grid. For larger windows tape multiple sheets together.


Containers for seed germination: Upcycled pots and tubs to hold them


It's time to start stratifying seeds in many parts of the country. In Nature's Action Guide, I included directions for stratifying seed outdoors in milk jugs. Here, I'd like to stress that most any container that your household produces in abundance, will work equally well. A drill is handy for making drainage

> Tubs with the lid cut out and screened protect seeds


too. If the container doesn't have a clear lid, cover it with upcycled clear plastic bags secured with a rubber band.














Then, cut a false bottom that fits on top of the filler. Cut drainage slits in the false bottom as shown at left.

This will economize on the more expensive or time-consuming to prepare seeding mix.
